#### Tēnā koutou Families

Welcome back for term 2. As always we have a lot planned with syndicates planning trips and activities to support their curriculum delivery. Reports will be going home at the end of this term and the opportunity to talk to the teachers about your child's achievement progress will be in week 10 through the conferences. Please keep a close eye on the school calendar and website notices for ongoing information.

- The new fencing and gates will soon be complete and once we have the official sign off, will be operational. Steps are currently being made for the outside of the pedestrian gates on both Abbott St and Ottawa Rd so children will be able to enter the school if an adult is not present to reach the latch. The gates are intended to prevent children leaving the grounds during the school day, as opposed to a security strategy to keep people out.
- A highlight of the last week of term was spending a day at Forest Lakes Camping facility with Tūī. Congratulations to Chantal and the Tūī team who ran an awesome camp experience. They were having such a great time, very eager to share the experiences they had had so far. There was no way out of me going on the mudslide and since I was already wet, I got to kayak as well! A huge thank you to all the parents who attended camp you were amazing. The camp is such a key event for our year 6 tauira and only possible with the input of willing teachers and helpers.
- We were very grateful for the beautiful sunny day for our cross country event yesterday. Thank you to those of you able to take time out of your busy days to attend and support. Having a sunny day also meant the children could be out on the courts supporting as enthusiastic spectators too. Once again the wonderful Lionel, 'Pops', ran every race, supporting the runners, bringing up the rear so no one was left behind. This year we also had Phil O'Brien as the pace setter, leading the races and supporting the front runners. Thank you to Dan who once again ran an awesome, well organised event.

As mentioned in our last newsletter, we have started our professional development journey implementing PB4L-SW ((Positive Behaviour for Learning - School Wide). We already operate under the philosophy of PB4L-SW so this involvement will help embed and strengthen our practice as well as formalising our procedures across the school. Amy and Alison will be involved in data gathering with a PB4L-SW facilitator soon to get some baseline data and as previously mentioned, this term there will be an opportunity for your input.

Our mathematics professional development continues this term with a focus on assessment for learning so our data collection and information about progress remain robust. Our work is tied closely to the NZ Curriculum Refresh in mathematics.

At our staff only day on Monday, teachers participated in a session led by our NZ Curriculum Refresh leaders, Jack and Megan. In the afternoon we attended curriculum sessions with local schools, organised as part of our Kāhui ako collaboration.

Work continued over the holiday break on our exciting new mural. The wall is now painted, ready for installation of the painted panels designed to tell the story in metaphor of the children's learning journey, growing through each of the syndicates before they ascend to new heights as a Tūī flying off and over the seas on adventures. It has been really exciting seeing the concepts develop from the children's ideas through to the finished panels. We'll be having a celebration to 'open' the mural once completed so keep an eye out for details.

Thank you for the payments in so far for both the family donation and activity donation. The activity donation included \$40 per child for the swimming programme, which costs the school for swimming instruction through Easy Swim and running costs. We then allowed \$15 per term for other trips and visitors. For many of our excursions it is the transport costs that are the main expense and most activities also have a cost. We are lucky to have some free opportunities which are appreciated, but these sometimes still cost for transport. Last year's activity donation was substantially less as we held over the amounts not used from the previous year which was disrupted due to Covid-19. We carefully monitor the costs to ensure your donation is used appropriately.

You may have seen in the media that primary and area school principals who are NZEI TE Riu Roa members voted to stop working with the Ministry of Education and to limit working hours to 8am - 5pm during the week (no evening or weekend work!). This is not a decision principals across New Zealand have taken lightly. Principals believe that the Government and Ministry of Education need to act boldly to address key issues schools are facing and have taken this action to highlight the significant issues that need addressing in the current round of negotiations. We are proud of the role that we have in our kura/schools and community but do not receive sufficient staffing or resourcing to meet the many requirements placed on us, nor to meet the needs and aspirations of our staff and students. This is not a sustainable situation, so principals are taking action to urge the government to act.

Principals are committed to continuing to lead our schools and to ensure that they are safe, healthy places where students are learning during this time. As such, our day-to-day work will continue, but we have been asked not to work with the Ministry on their education system work or to introduce or implement new initiatives. Principals make a significant contribution of time and expertise to this work, yet there is little additional resource or staffing to support this. We do not want to impact our work with boards, so that has not been included in this industrial action. We hope to receive an acceptable offer in negotiations so the work ban can end.

You may also have heard of the upcoming change in class ratio for years 4 – 8 to 1:28. Schools are funded for teachers based on various staffing formulae that generate an entitlement for every school based on roll size and year levels. The main way this occurs is through curriculum staffing ratios. The current staffing ratio for years 4 to 8 is 1 teacher to every 29 students. This ratio of 1:28 is still far too high and will make very little difference to actual class numbers, especially given this is a staffing ratio rather than the actual number of children in a classroom. However, it is a good start, and the direction is right. The ratio needs to be dropped further and the NZ Principals Federation will continue lobbying to reduce the ratio to 1:25. They believe that would start to make tangible differences in student achievement. Across New Zealand we have a broad diversity of students in our schools and the levels of

learning support needs are significantly higher than when these ratios were first set. NZPF believes it is time for some drastic cuts to the staff:student ratios.

### **Duties of the Treasurer:**

- Maintain the PTA bank account: i.e. keep a record of all money coming in and out with money assigned to specific fundraising projects where required
- Monitor and set up all invoices to be paid via the PTA bank account
- Present a Treasurer's report to each PTA Meeting to ensure an accurate and up-to-date financial picture of the organisation. This includes:
  - All income raised and expenditure incurred since the last meeting;
  - o future funds committed to specific items or projects; and
  - o total funds available.
- Prepare annual financial statements for the Annual General Meeting which includes all money raised during the year and all money invested.
- Count and deposit money from fundraisers when required.
- Prepare cash floats for fundraisers when needed
- Have knowledge of the Kindo system for setting up the selling of items and for the downloading of orders, as well as checking ongoing payments made to the PTA bank account by Kindo.
- File Annual return with the Charities Commission.

Blue Dragon Book Fair at Ngaio Town Hall Saturday 6 May 9am to 4pm AND Sunday 7 May 9am to 3pm.


We invite you to come and buy books, puzzles/games, DVDs and CDs at our annual book fair






WHAT WE NEED:
