### Tēnā koutou Families

Negotiations are continuing at Parliament this afternoon to try and find a way forward in the current stalled collective bargaining of primary and area school teacher and principal collective agreements. Should the primary teacher strike on Wednesday 31 May proceed, you will be notified on Sunday morning (28 May). Advice on the resumption of primary and area school principal workload and engagement with the Ministry bans, will follow next week.

Amazing progress is being made on our new mural. If you've been in the school recently you may have noticed the wall painted a lovely bright colour with a background scene in readiness for the mural pieces. It's been a great process and exciting to have had so much involvement from students in the lead up to the design and then painting the panels. Once they're installed we'll be preparing QR codes with content explaining our values and singing our school waiata. We're also planning for a community celebration to officially 'open' the mural.

I'm really proud of our teachers of year 1 and 2 who are working really hard to complete their Better Start Literacy mini-credential with Canterbury University. You may have watched the Newshub item on Wednesday's news and the follow up programme by Paddy Gower about literacy which included mention of the Better Start Literacy Programme. We're pleased to be ahead of the game with our professional development already in place. We traditionally have good reading results at Ngaio School so we are pleased to be introducing this approach to further scaffold our young readers in their reading achievement. The approach also impacts writing so it will be interesting to see any impact from this on our writing achievement as well.

Our Positive Learning for Behaviour - School Wide (PB4L-SW) leaders and the wider team have been attending workshops over the past term, the latest one just this week. It is exciting starting to get into some of the more practical aspects of the development with some work around the school's values and expected behaviours across the school settings. There will be opportunities to support the process over this year so look out for more information soon.

Our mathematics professional development has continued this term with a further session around 'Assessment for Learning' and how it relates to the change from curriculum levels and achievement objectives to the phases of learning: Y1-3, Y4-6 in the Mathematics and Statistics area of Te Mātaiaho | the refreshed Curriculum Framework. The refreshed curriculum is progression-focused, rather than outcomes-focused. Each of the phases of learning contains progress outcomes that describe what

ākonga should understand, know, and do by the end of each phase. Students deepen their understanding of the big ideas (understand), as they explore the context (know), using critical practices (do). Each phase is cumulative, building on the last and increasingly complex as ākonga progress.

Teachers are currently writing the mid-year reports which will be sent home on Monday of week 10, prior to the Three-way Conferences. We have made some minor changes to the Reading section, matching to the current curriculum levels, instead of the smaller colour wheel divisions. We will send an explanation to help you understand the change with the report. Once we have transitioned to the refreshed curriculum for English and Mathematics & Statistics, the reports will be updated to reflect the change from curriculum levels and achievement objectives to the phases of learning relevant to our kura, Years 1-3 and Years 4-6.

Lastly, a huge thank you to Roslyn who has worked tirelessly in her role as Chair of the PTA. Roslyn is often seen around the school taking care of the gardens and supporting our tauira in their enviro responsibilities so we're grateful this will continue. Ros you're a superstar and we appreciate you being so involved. I know the PTA will continue to appreciate your ongoing contributions as a committee member.

## **MEASLES**

We have been sent information from the Ministry of Education to share with whānau about measles. Key messages included:

- Measles is a very serious illness and it spreads much faster than COVID-19.
- If there is a measles case at our school, pupils, and staff not protected from measles will need to stay away from school until the measles risk has passed.

Measles is a notifiable disease to public health so we are required to call Public Health if we become aware of any case at our school.

### COVID-19

We are continuing to be notified of cases of COVID-19 amongst families and staff. Please continue to be vigilant, testing when required and keeping children at home if they are unwell.

The Ministry of Education no longer strongly encourages mask wearing in school settings and they are not required on public or school transport. As the MoE guidelines do not require mask wearing by students, we encourage you to discuss at home how you will respond, as these guidelines contradict the current information on the COVID-19 website regarding mask wearing by household and close contacts. We will support any students who wear a mask at school and staff may also choose to wear a mask if they have identified household or close contacts in their class.

- sore throat
- body aches
- fever
- cough

- feeling tired
