THE CLINIC UPDATE

The Clinic has started to hit its stride this term, with a few more volunteers signed up making arranging sessions easier.

In week 5 we were able to work with the Pohutukawa teachers to facilitate some hands on bug hunting sessions making use of leaf litter and soil samples from the Arb. Feedback from the teachers was that this type of hands-on learning experience was amazing, not only for the scientific learnings, but also for softer skills, including - but not exclusively - sharing and careful use of equipment; language and vocabulary development; teamwork and cooperation. Every Pohutukawa student was able to participate which made this a really special experience for the Clinic.

In the latter half of the term we have enjoyed a session with Tui students, taking apart and exploring old electronics sourced from Trash Palace, as well as a fabulous, joyful session of creating with recyclable materials with a huge turnout from the Tui and Kakapo syndicates (thanks to a wet day lunch!). We saw incredible imagination and unbridled creativity from all of the tamariki who came along. To conclude the term we have a session in week 10 for Pohutukawa, doing some basic weaving activities.

We also have plans in place already for term 3 including some basic First Aid skills sessions that will be run by a volunteering parent, and an orienteering event! But our focus will continue to be providing opportunities for a wide range of free play and fun.

DOG POLICY REMINDER

We've recently had some questions about dogs in the school grounds so have included the school policy here for your information.

During school hours (8.30 am – 3.30 pm), dogs may only be brought onto school grounds by prior arrangement. Dogs are an important part of life for many Ngaio School families, and are often included in activities such as walking children to and from school. The school appreciates this inclusion and values the place the dog has within a family. It also acknowledges that some people can find contact with dogs stressful, and even frightening.

Parents who bring dogs on to school grounds (by prior arrangement in school hours, or after hours) do so on the understanding that their dog has no issues around children, has never displayed any aggression towards children, and that the owner believes the dog is fully trustworthy in a school environment.

Owners bringing a dog or dogs on to the school grounds must follow the guidelines below.

Guidelines

- All dogs must be on a leash that keeps the dog reasonably close to the adult. The leash must be held by an adult. Specific "in-school dogs" may be exempted from being on lead with approval from the principal.
- Dogs must not be left unattended.
- If the dog is considered by the council or any other authority to be a breed that needs muzzling, the dog must not come onto school grounds.
- Only dogs with special permission from the principal or board are allowed inside school buildings.
- Dog owners should help educate children about how best to approach their dog.
- Dogs are not allowed to drink from school water fountains.
- Owners must remove any mess left by their dog.

ROAD SAFETY CONCERNS

Please help to keep Ngaio School children safe. We continue to hear of poor driving behaviour on Abbott St including:

- U-turns
- Parking across driveways
- Parking on yellow lines
- Walking across the road away from the pedestrian crossing.

These incidents are not only unsafe, but are really bad role modelling for the children. We know mornings are a busy time, but these behaviours can also give children the message that it's ok to make bad decisions if you're in a rush!

ABBOTT ST DROP OFF ZONE

For the drop off zone to work successfully, we need you to follow some protocols:

- Please drive as far forward as space allows so other cars can get in behind yours.
- Stay in the car.
- Be prepared for your child to exit the car on the footpath side without your help the parent/teacher on duty will open the door and help them with their bag if needed.
- Leave the parking zone promptly to allow other cars to move in.

We do understand there are occasions where items like scooters need to be retrieved from the boot, but usually you should be able to remain in the car.
