Action by Primary Teachers and Principals

Health and Safety at School Events

Everyone will have heard about the Abbey Caves incident and the tragedy that unfolded. This has put renewed focus on safety and the responsibility the school has to review and ensure a safe environment for its students, both at school and during external events.

The Board's role in health and safety

A primary objective of the board of Ngaio School is to ensure that the school is a physically and emotionally safe place for all students and staff, as required by the Education and Training Act 2020 (s. 127) and in support of the Statement of National Education and Learning Priorities (NELP: Priority 1).

The board is required to regularly review how well it implements key legislative and regulatory requirements, including those related to health, safety, and welfare, and takes steps as required to address any gaps in implementation.

SchoolDocs advisories are issued 2-3 times per term and provide information on policy or procedure changes and provide information about upcoming reviews and Board Assurances. The Ngaio School board reviews policies highlighted in each advisory and advises the principal and school community of any significant changes.

Annual Plan Update

Each year, the Board sets some goals for the school as part of our strategic planning. These goals are not for the everyday core business of the school, we expect that to happen anyway, but for extra things that lift the practices at the school and push us forward.

At the halfway stage, we are confident that the school is making great progress towards achieving the objectives set out in the annual plan. Areas where the school has made significant progress to our objectives in the first two terms include:

Creatives Project We were thrilled to 'open' our Piki ki te Tūī mural this week. Thank you to Christen Stewart who

• PB4L

The PB4L team has been attending professional development sessions and leading the wider staff in this development. They are currently gathering ākonga voice about our school's ROCKET values which will help inform their work around defining the values. We look forward to more opportunities for the community to engage with this work.

• Te Reo Curriculum and PLD.

We have seen good progress in this annual plan goal, with Hayden and Wendy engaged in Kura Ahurea, a cultural support programme for schools. The programme has been designed by Wellington mana whenua and provides a Te Āti Awa ki Te Whanganui a Tara / Taranaki Whānui perspective on local historical narratives, tikanga and kawa. Teachers continue to embed the revised Ngaio School Tikanga and Te Reo progressions in their classroom programmes.

• The Clinic

The Clinic is back up and running. After a few years without The Clinic, we set a target of restarting The Clinic and running two sessions a term from term three. Thanks to amazing community volunteers, we have exceeded that target, running at least two sessions per syndicate in both Term 1 and Term 2!

A full summary of progress will be provided at the end of term 4.

Digital curriculum

This term the Board heard a presentation from the school's digital lead Tessa Gatenby. Digital literacy should be an essential part of children's growth and development at Ngaio School with use of technology integrated into other learning areas as well as specific teaching of computational thinking as children progress through the school.

There are two technological areas related to Digital Technology in the New Zealand Curriculum:

- computational thinking, where students develop an understanding of computer science principles that underlie all digital technologies. Students learn core programming concepts so they can become creators of digital technology, not just users; and
- designing and developing digital outcomes, where students learn how to design quality, fit-for-purpose digital solutions

Ngaio School is currently unable to reach the standard of learning set out in the New Zealand Curriculum for the area of Digital Technology, entirely due to the availability and standard of our stock of devices.

The Board is working with staff to understand the needs of the school and develop a solution that means teachers are able to deliver our curriculum.

Property

Masterplan and playgrounds

A board subcommittee which includes members of the PTA are beginning work to plan development of the outdoor space at Ngaio School. The initial focus will be the junior playground and additional nature and play space by the stage as described in the Landscape Masterplan.

Bike Track Update

At our meeting on 22 June, the Board made the decision not to pursue the development of a bike track at Ngaio School.

Over the past few years there has been much consultation and discussion about the idea of adding a bike track to the school field. There had been funding available towards the project and it was included in the school's Landscape Masterplan.

Despite the many benefits of an all weather track, on the balance of feedback to date, development cost and the ongoing cost and effort of maintenance, we have decided that we would rather focus investment in other projects.
